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President's Message

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In Memory Ken & Anna Staver As I write this, winter still has a firm grip on the mid state and more bad weather is predicted. Even so, Jim Egenreider and his crew are in the midst of constructing the small portable greenhouses in which we plan to grow up our plants for the annual spring native plant sale. Lindsay Johnson and her dad and mom have constructed and delivered the tables on which the plants are to be grown. Potting day was originally scheduled for the first weekend in March but due to the frigid weather the date was postponed until March 14. In the meantime, the young plants are getting an early start in our sunroom. This

year's sale, scheduled for May 2 at Schaffner Park in Hummelstown, will be newly configured and entirely different from previous sales at Meadowood Nursery. It is going to feature a number of vendors who will offer additional wonderful native plants, including trees, shrubs and woodland species. We should also note that our friend, Jay George, will be donating 40 blooming- sized trilliums to the Conservancy for sale at the event.. It takes 7 years for a trillium to reach the point at which it is ready to bloom so this is an extraordinary gift---and a wonderful opportunity for our patrons.

Our first Benefit event, "A Sense of Wonder", was held in February at the WITF Public Media Center and was thoroughly enjoyed by the many attendees. Where else would one find such an effective melding of Science, Music, and Wonder at the majesty of the natural world? Probably very few other places. We thank Dr. Keith Cheng for demonstrating to us that science, music, and awe can be so intimately linked and we thank our own Dr. Richard Zaino for setting the stage perfectly by showing us some of the many images that evoke wonder for him. Executive director, Shaun Levi, orchestrated the evening and we thank her for her enthusiasm and creativity. Of course, a lot of other people helped to make this a successful event, too, and I thank them all. One of the most wonderful things about the Conservancy is its cadre of enthusiastic supporters and volunteers.

Work continues on the Preservation front. The Small Valley Girl Scout project has been in the works, so to speak, for more than two years. Final papers will be signed within a few weeks and when that happens, it will be a red-letter day for us, for the Girl Scouts in the Heart of PA, and for all of you who have supported the project through your interest and your contributions. In the months to come, you will hear about some of the other projects on which we are working. Each one is unique and requires its own individualized approach. It is very heartening to know that there is still land to be protected in our region and that there are land owners who are willing to give up development value so that their special properties can be protected long into the future. We are grateful to each person/family for their generosity. We are most appreciative of the abilities of Preservation Director, Sally Zaino, and our competent staff that allow our projects to move forward in a professional and efficient manner.

For those of you who value the work of the Manada Conservancy and who would like to help to assure its long term health and financial stability, I invite you to consider a legacy gift of some kind. 27 Acres Preserved in Lower Paxton Township

much-needed protection along Paxton Creek

Behind the commercial strip development on Linglestown Road, and between the patches of suburban sprawl along Colonial Road, meanders the Paxton Creek. It traverses through scattered housing, was re-routed for Interstate 81, and feeds Wildwood Lake and then the Susquehanna River. Draining a 27- square mile area northeast of Harrisburg, the Paxton Creek is a threatened resource, and it needs every inch of protected forest buffer that it can get.



Thanks to the vision of Doug and Nadine Neidich, it just got some more. A 27-acre oasis for wildlife and water quality in Lower Paxton Township will now be off-limits to any further development and disturbance. Doug Neidich is no stranger to conservation, as evidenced by the careful planting of PA Native trees, removal of invasive plants and maintenance of the mature native woodlands that border the Creek on his land. He is also an enthusiastic proponent of historic preservation: part of the protected wetland areas are near the historic Mount Hill Tavern, owned by the Neidichs, which has been restored to preserve its special sense of place in history. The three-


parcel property is now united by a conservation easement, which protects the majority of it as a High Protection Area, and prevents further subdivision.

The completion of this project was one of the most efficient we have ever done, thanks to all of the quick work by everyone involved. Thanks to our staff, especially Jennifer and Richelle, who completed easement drafting and baseline studies, respectively, and to our attorney, Jean Seibert, who kept things moving (even while in New Mexico, expecting a grandchild!). The Board of Directors as well as Sally and Shaun all had important parts to play in finalizing the project. We are grateful to the Neidichs for their vision and their legacy of habitat, water quality protection, and open space in an area where it is so much needed, and we welcome them as our newest Partners in Preservation.

SMALL VALLEY UPDATE

Almost there....almost there...

We are very excited to be finalizing this wonderful project in the very near future. Shaun has been busy communicating with the PA Dept of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR), our granting agency, to get the final paperwork complete. Richelle has been very busy in the field, documenting current property conditions, with her fantastic group of volunteers, and compiling her final reports. Consultants have been dispatched to evaluate environmental conditions, and to do a final survey. It is all coming together—we hope to be able to announce completion in our next newsletter. We've been patient for almost three years, so we will be patient just a little longer! But to share some of our excitement, here is the draft of the 3'x4' sign that will go on the property. Stay tuned for more details in the next newsletter!

Meet Paulina Burgdorf, Manada's Native Plant Sale Volunteer Coordinator!

It is with great anticipation that I look forward to Manada Conservancy's 15th annual native plant sale at a new venue. As volunteer coordinator for the plant sale since the fall of 2008, I continue to be grateful for the enthusiastic volunteers who commit their time and efforts to our plant sale. The plant sale is a great way for volunteers to build community and camaraderie as we focus on the positive environmental impact we have established in the surrounding area.

My husband Greg and I continue to add native plants to our gardens to attract and provide habitat to pollinators and birds in our yard. It is rewarding to watch our yard as it transforms to a more natural habitat. One of our favorite native perennial plants are the asters. Their beautiful colors dominate our natural areas in the late Summer and Autumn, attracting many butterflies. I hope that you will continue to support the Conservancy and visit the 2015 native plant sale.

Meet Andy Groff, Manada's Native Plant Sale Committee Chair!

The Manada Conservancy's members have a variety of reasons for being passionate about environmental causes, but for me nothing is as rewarding as gardening with native plants.

Every spring, I look forward to our native plant sale, knowing that my purchase not only supports the Conservancy's mission financially, but will also help improve and restore our ecosystem. It's not an abstract concept—what I plant is right there outside my door and it will continue to reward me and the local fauna for years to come. "Plant it and they will come." I'm not sure who first said that, but it's true: the research shows that every native plant species has a function in our ecosystem. Each butterfly, bee, and other pollinators have distinctive mouthparts that are designed for a particular flower or nectar source, or have young that are able to feed only on a particular type of plant. The more types of plants you incorporate into your landscape the more of these beneficial critters will come.

It always amazes me that in the middle of an old suburban development whose native plants were dug up generations ago, when I have planted that one certain plant, those critters will find it. One early summer morning a couple years ago I watched the pipevine swallow-tail search all morning for just the right spot to lay her eggs on my pipevine. I bought the vine the previous year, knowing it was the host plant for that particular butterfly, which I had never seen before. The next year the bluebirds and cedar waxwings made their first appearance on my grove of chokeberries. One more piece of the puzzle had been restored.

Some of our members have only postage stamp size yards in midtown Harrisburg while others have forested lots that stretch for acres, but there are native plants at our annual sale for any size yard and situation. And we love to hear your stories, share our passion for plants, help you learn, and also learn from you. So come to our sale, help support our cause, plant it, and they will come.

From greenhouse construction, to potting day, and throughout the event planning process,
